






- SPC: Scientific Program Committee
 - Chair from the host region: Rogelio Thomas (CERN)
 - 8 MC coordinators from the host region [EMEA] and 4 each from the two other regions
 - LPR coordinator
 - OC chair
 - Co-opted members from the LOC.
 - There are 3 meetings of the SPC before the conference, they are named SPC1 (about 18 months before the conference), SPC2 (at the previous IPAC) and SPC3 (about 5 months before the conference).
- OC: Organising Committee
 - Chair from the host region: Peter McIntosh (STFC, UK)
 - 16 members from the host region
 - 8 members each from the two other regions
 - Co-opted members from the LOC





- SAB: Scientific Advisory Board
 - 40 members from the host region
 - 25 members each from the two other regions
- LOC: Local Organising Committee
 - Local team that prepares the conference in the host country
- JACoW: Joint Accelerator Conferences Website (JACoW)
 - International collaboration that edits and publishes the proceedings of accelerator conferences, including IPAC





- <u>January 2025</u>: The **SPC**, **OC** and **SAB** are invited by the scientific secretary on behalf of the **SPC** chair to submit abstracts for invited talks.
- In average we receive 400 proposal, that's an average of 5 per person, but prefer quality over quantity!
- <u>Deadline</u> for suggesting invited talks: Friday 14th March
- Then the Editor in Chief and the Scientific Secretary checks the abstracts (Q&A).
- Mid-April 2025 until Friday 2nd May:
 All SPC members (and only SPC members) select
 5 favourite + 5 second choice in each MC (80 votes in total).

Suggesting an invited talk: who does what? (and when) [2/2]



- <u>During the 2 weeks before SPC2</u>: **MC coordinators** identify from the votes the top choices for their MC, keeping in mind diversity criteria.
- At SPC2 (around IPAC'25 in May 2025):
 - MC coordinators present their top choices and reserve list
 - All SPC members discuss the top choices for all MC
 - On second day MC coordinators present a revised list of top choices that is discussed
 - Tentative list of invited talks and reserve is approved by all SPC members.
 - Invited plenaries are drawn from this list as well.

After SPC2:

- The **Scientific Secretary** will contact all invited speakers.
- SPC chair finalizes the list of invited speakers based on speaker's replies.



Suggesting an invited talk: Diversity!



- Diversity is key to make the conference interesting to all!
- Diversity of **region**: 50% of speakers from the host region [EMEA Europe, Middle East and Africa], 25% each from the other regions [Asia and Americas].
- Diversity of **gender**: please do not forget to suggest female speaker
- Diversity of **experience**: some young speakers are welcome alongside more experienced speakers.
- Diversity of **projects/topics**: it is important to cover projects and topics not covered during the last 3 IPACs.





- New this year: 2 questions to help assess diversity (speaker gender and seniority)





What is a good suggestion for an invited talk? (my personal opinion) [1/2]



- Disclaimer: SPC members are free to vote as they wishes, here I give my opinion on what I voted for as SPC member.
- A good title
- A short description highlighting the context of the project (not everyone knows about project ACRONYM), the novelty/originality of the project or of the work presented and its significance.
- Add a reference (at the end of the abstract) to a paper on previous work on that topic by the same author if possible (someone invited for an oral is likely to have already published on that topic).
- In comment: a short description of the speaker (gender, seniority, prizes,...)
- Correct classification: A mis-classified abstract will appear less pertinent.

What is a good suggestion for an invited talk? (my personal opinion) [2/2]




- Disclaimer: SPC members are free to vote as they wishes, here I give my opinion on what I voted for as SPC member.
- Remember: The speaker can make the difference for a talk being selected or not either for diversity reasons or because some people are known to be good speakers.
- As much as possible, do not propose speakers that already spoke (invited or contributed orals) during the last 3 IPACs, that does not match the "diversity" criteria.
- Please avoid placeholders: do not enter a title thinking that you will add the abstract and the rest later.
- Notes: SPC/OC members are not eligible for an oral at IPAC. SAB members are eligible but should not suggest themselves. Give a chance to a younger colleague instead!

Abstracts classification (track) Please check!



- Mis-classified abstract create difficulties.
- They can be reclassified after consultation of the MC coordinators but this process takes time.
- Until they are re-classified, they are in a MC where they appear less pertinent and thus may gather less votes.







- In the last 2 weeks before SPC2 the MC coordinators will review the votes to identify the top choices for their MC.
- This will be discussed by the SPC at SPC2.
- After SPC2, the SPC chair will have a list of selected speakers with a reserve.
- Some minor adjustments may be made to the list of invited speakers to preserve diversity.
- They will be contacted by the scientific secretary with the aim of having a full invited program by the autumn (10 months before the conference).



What about contributed orals?

- Contributed orals will be selected at SPC3 (~January 2026) among on the abstracts submitted for poster contribution.
- Deadline for abstract submission by authors will be SPC3-11 weeks
- SPC members will be invited to vote on the contributed abstract over a period of a month ending SPC3-2 weeks (usually this keeps you busy during the Christmas/winter shutdown of your favourite accelerator).
- The same procedure will apply:
 - All SPC members will vote on the abstracts
 - MC coordinators will pick the top list based on the votes and diversity criteria.
 - Scientific secretary will invite the speakers.
 - SPC chair will make the final list.





- As Editor in Chief I want to mention one key player of the IPACs.
- JACoW: The Joint Accelerator Conferences Website
- During each IPAC (and most other accelerator conferences) a team of volunteers checks every paper submitted to the conference to make sure that they meet strict publishing standard.
- The quality of the proceedings has been recognized by the allocation of a <u>Digital Object Identifier (doi)</u> number.
- Starting this year, the JACoW collaboration has obtained that some conference proceedings are indexed in Scopus.
- Thanks to them, more than 257 proceedings volumes, 76000 papers have been published.
- We will need volunteer editors from the 3 regions to join JACoW and the IPAC'26 Editorial Office!
